St Mary's Church, Ixworth, Saturday, 18 June 2016 Concert review by Ed Wilson, Top tenor:-

I recently received cufflinks in recognition of my membership of SEMVC over the last 25 years, however, Saturday was the very first time that I have heard the choir in concert!

The opening song, *Every Time I feel the Spirit* set the tone, joyously sung and creating a good atmosphere. The choir showed off its whole repertoire in the first set, from the solemn warmth of *The Lord's Prayer* to a rousing climax in *Speed Your Journey* and a lively rendition of *When the Saints*.

The Vocalistics Choir, ten pupils from Ixworth Free School aged between 11 and 14 years, then sang their first selection, starting with a delightful medley of songs from 'The Glums' ("Le Miserables"), with solos impressively shared by five different singers. They finished their first set with a moving and very harmonious *Fields of Gold*.

SEMVC's second set started with the warm Gallic sound of *Autumn Leaves* followed by an ethereal rendition of *Seal Lullaby* which had a very strong sense of the swell of the sea. *The Rose* followed displaying the choir's fine range of dynamics ending in a rousing third verse and, for me, the highlight of the first half, the superb *What Would I do Without My Music*.

The second half opened with SEMVC joyously singing *There is Nothin' Like a Dame* which featured two solos of great fun by Nick Gane. After a swooning rendition of *Embraceable You*, great control was displayed in their version of Robbie Williams' *Angels* with excellent middle harmonies. Accompanists John Ottley and Calvin Goymer came to the fore with all hands on the keyboard setting a fine regular set pace for the rigorous, foot tapping *Rhythm of Life*, with the choir wrapping their tongues around the fast and furious lyrics really well.

The Vocalistics second set opened with a selection from *Into the Woods*, a major musical challenge that the pupils dealt with admirably. It involved four different soloists and some excellent group harmonies; no mean achievement considering the choir was only ten strong. They concluded their singing with a beautiful, five star performance of Joni Mitchell's, *Both Sides Now*.

For the evening's final set, SEMVC opened with a smooth rendition of *Anthem* from the musical *Chess* that gradually built up to a rousing finale. The following Burt Bacharach numbers *What the World Needs Now* and *I'll Never Fall in Love Again* were the second half highlights and proved Mark Jefferson's intuition to be spot on that Bacharach's work suits the choir. The evening was concluded with a reverent and moving rendition of the Welsh classic *Morte Criste*, for which Mark persuaded past and present choir members in the audience to step up and sing. *Mustang Sally* was duly sung as the audience requested the obligatory encore and it inevitably brought the house down with a deserved and prolonged applause.

I was very impressed by the quality of SEMVC at this, my first attendance at a concert in a non-performing role. The choir is much indebted to the fine musical team of John Ottley, Calvin Goymer and musical director Mark Jefferson in the training and leadership that they give. Over the years they have developed a most accomplished choir that sings an excellent and eclectic range of songs. There literally is "something for everyone".

Charity

On 29 July, Concert Manager Ian represented SEMVC at St Edmundsbury former mayor, Councillor Patrick Chung's final presentation of the £28k raised for charities during his mayoral year. The choir has received £100 from the Mayor's charities.

SEMVC at Elmswell Over 55's Club, 14 July

Following a welcome by Diann from the Over 55's Club, the concert began with *Every Time I feel the Spirit* which would have woken up the listeners had they needed it. Mark Jefferson welcomed everyone too and explained that a concert on a Thursday was unusual for the choir as it was their usual rehearsal night. He apologised in advance if some of the items were sung rather fast due to the Baritones wanting to get to the bar where they usually end up on a Thursday!

You Raise Me Up included good use of dynamics and clear diction. At one point during the song the basses crossed into the baritones. The hall, having a high ceiling gave it the acoustic of a cathedral.

African Trilogy included a solo by David Sadler, recently returned from a two week tour of the USA with the punk band with whom he sings and plays bass guitar. The last song of this section was When the Saints Go Marching In with the false ending which catches out many an unsuspecting audience. However, the pause was shortened, which worked very well. In particular the chimes at the end of this song were very melodic and a fine climax to this part of the concert.

Calvin Goymer, assistant accompanist, played a medley of songs from musicals. He was an Elmswell boy and is a very talented musician and a huge support to the choir. The medley included *Anything Goes, Making Whoopee, I Got Rhythm* and *Edelweiss*. Persuaded to play an encore - *Lambeth Walk*, the choir and audience joined in with the "Oi's". The affection felt by both the choir and Elmswell was tangible in the following applause. *Autumn Leaves* (my current favourite) was followed by *The Rose* from the film starring Bette Midler; "love is a rose and a razor". Mark mused about a future concert with Bette Midler as the guest soloist........

What Would I Do Without My Music expresses the universal language of music and the choir did it justice. Without organ accompaniment for the last verse of American Trilogy, the choir brought power to the final phrases with their voices. Sadly, some of the phrases in this song were split by breathing.

Pace of the concert increased in the second half with *There Is Nothing Like A Dame*, soloist was Nick Gane. Mouth movements did not always match the words in this song. To celebrate the 90th birthday of Elmswell resident, John who enjoys male voice choir music *Morte Criste* was sung along with *Happy Birthday*. *Embraceable You* slowed the mood down and where more good use of dynamics and a neat cut-off was heard. Robbie Williams' *Angels* included for the first time, guitarist Simon Shirm. The guitar added an additional and highly effective dimension to this popular piece.

Rhythm of Life, conducted by David Sadler enabled Mark to join Calvin on the keyboard. While Calvin is superb, not even he can play a four hand accompaniment on his own! The Denture-fix representative breathed a sigh of relief after the two fast pieces in the choir's repertoire were completed without any losses. The interlude in the second half comprised SEMVC bass Ross Van de Zande, Simon on guitar and Calvin on keyboard. They performed Guardian Angel, Mad World and Crocodile Rock, with SEMVC and the audience providing backing for the latter piece. Additionally, two pieces from Les Misérables were performed – the very high, Bring Him Home and the rousing Do You Hear The People Sing both demonstrating the choir's beautiful dynamic range.

SEMVC are planning to record a fourth CD in the next few months which will include some specially arranged Burt Bacharach pieces. Although still being rehearsed, the choir ended the programme with *What The World Needs Now* and *I'll Never Fall In Love Again*. The Over 55's Club committee expressed their thanks to the choir, Mark, Calvin, Simon and Ross.

Following rousing applause, the choir performed *Mustang Sally* as an encore. SEMVC then adjourned to the bar to enjoy a most welcome buffet. Jill and Paul Davis (bass)
